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# **Letters to the editor.**

I for one feel that flight is a great and important part of archery and I will support you in any way I can. I already have read your Bowstrings and Carbon 1 arrows, and the 1339meters shot. I echo your sadness regarding the demise of Heather Urquhart and I will miss her at both the clout and flight shoots. I wonder if you have looked at the internet as a suitable means of distribution clearly

this may be cheaper than the post.

I have made a twin bow up made from two old bows and I think it may be worth shooting flight, I have tried it and it shot about 140 yards ( and 112 yards shot as a single bow) this the sort of thing you want to publish? The bow I have made with two bows as you can see fixed in the handle area with small screws the front bow is pointing forwards to get the weight right. The Main bow is 36 Pounds at 64" and the Front 18 pound at 45.5" I have added two plastic wedges at about 5" from the contact points which you can in the photos on my tiller at 6" fistmele with a 23" arrow it measured at 35 pounds at full draw. I previously tried the bow and got 120 yard without the front bow and 145 Yards with it strung up. the plastic wedges were at 6" out.

The Penobscot tribe used their bows to attack canoes at very long ranges but I don't know the weights they used. Its interesting that the Penobscot devised a compound bow from simple elements which were effective in their defense. I will bring the bow to the N.C flight shoot. Who knows, it could shoot in a class of it own.

I just had a brainwave. We currently have Grand Master flight, Master flight and First class flight for both gents and ladies. Why not revamp these to include Second and Third class flight, similar to target archery?

This could be based on existing distances but with ladies first class becoming third class flight; ladies master flight becoming second class flight and existing gents Grand master, Master and First class as existing? I think this could boost flight numbers and certainly add more incentive without diluting the top classes? I think its certainly worth considering for the future of flight, as a number of archers come once or twice just to get a classification and then quit?

# From the Archives:

# The First West Midlands Flight Championships, 1952

45 lb bow outshoots 70 lb.

The first west midlands flight championships attracted 19 enthusiasts to Goodyear Park to compete for the Charles Moore Bugle.

#### Ladies

Mrs M.E Bayliss, Apollo Archers: 200 yards (40lb steel bow). WMAA Silver plated medal for the greatest distance.

Mrs Bates, W'hampton Coy. of A: 151 yards (40 lb Kestrel) WMAA Silver plated arrow brooch for the second greatest distance

#### Gentlemen

Mr R. Wyre, W'hampton Coy. of A: 300 yards (45 lb solid light alloy steel bow)

C.H.Moore Bugle and WMAA silver plated medal for the greatest distance.

Mr O. Wyre, W'hampton Coy. of A: 256 yards (70 lb solid alloy steel bow)

WMAA Silver plated arrow brooch for the second greatest distance

#### Focus on....Arrows

Carbon arrows are certainly an improvement over aluminium any day – lighter, slimmer and a lot faster. Try using a lighter pile on the arrow. This has two effects- to make the arrow shoot a little stiffer (so losing less energy) and to move the balance point back towards the centre of the arrow. Both could improve distances.

Try using smaller fletchings (even trimming them down with a sharp knife). Usually smaller fletchings will also give improved distances.

Give your arrows a good coating of Talc (or other dry lubricant such as powdered graphite), as well as putting talc on your string, arrow rest, tab – anywhere two surfaces rub together. Cutting down on friction will give a much faster shot and improve distances.

In the last edition, two new Nano-carbon arrows were reported, Carbon Express' "Nano XR" and Easton "Carbon 1". Both offered a big saving in weight over most other carbon arrows. The National Flight Championships offered a chance to try both off a Mathews Monster XLR8. As the name suggests, this bow is indeed a monster (but more on that in the next edition). Results were indeed impressive, with both showing a big improvement in distance over other arrows (it was the Carbon 1 which took the 45 lb target compound trophy, even beating all compounds in the 60 lb class as well). Certainly one to watch for the future.

# A Brief History of flight 2

The Turks were perhaps the most gifted of the ancient flight archers. In 1792, in the presence of three gentlemen of the Royal Tox, Mahmoun Effendi (secretary to the Turkish embassy in London) shot an arrow 482 yards with the wind. Six years later, in 1798, the Sultan in Turkey drove an arrow 972 yards, a distance verified by Sir Robert Ainslie, Ambassador to the Ports.

This was at a time when the Longbow reigned supreme in England, and distances for the English Longbow rarely bettered 200yards.

In it's hayday, the English longbow seldom exceeded 300 yards. Ford himself states that "very few archers can cover more than or even as much as 300 yards". The longest shot he made was 308 yards, using a Buchanan self-you long-bow.

<u>Editors note even today, only a handful of archers have</u> managed to shoot beyond 300 yards, especially in the 50lbs class. Here, the world records stands at 324 yards.
